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## ENVIRONMENTALIST BILL MCKIBBEN LEADS CONFERENCE ON THE ECONOMIC IMPACTS OF CLIMATE CHANGE

PHILADELPHIA—Renowned environmentalist and author Bill McKibben will be the keynote speaker at a free public conference on climate change and its social and economic impacts Monday, Sept. 20, at the Academy of Natural Sciences.

McKibben, founder of the international climate campaign 350.org, is the featured speaker for "Global Warming 2010: Creating Jobs and Saving the Planet," presented by the Academy's Center for Environmental Policy, Citizens for Pennsylvania's Future (PennFuture), American Cities Foundation and 350philly! The discussion will cover the who, what, when, where and why of climate change and the opportunities it provides to expand the economy, create green jobs, and preserve the planet. Global warming initiatives will be discussed, along with pending state and federal legislation. The conference also will include a panel discussion with Leslie Fields, national environmental justice and community partnerships director for the Sierra Club; Andrew Lavine, lead organizer of 350philly!; Michael Alan Livermore, executive director of the Institute for Policy Integrity at New York University School of Law; and Jerome Sanders, managing director of BITH Energy and Engineering Services.
