Featuring summer camp and environmental miniature golf!

PHILADELPHIA—The Academy of Natural Sciences this summer offers many ways to have fun while soaking up fascinating information about nature and the environment. For starters, try summer camp, indoor environmental miniature golf, and a unique art exhibit of scientific illustrations by an Academy scientist.

Here are the programs and exhibits coming up this summer. All are free with museum admission except where noted:

Art of Science Gallery Exhibit A PENNSYLVANIA FISHERY: FISH PORTRAITS BY FLICK FORD Saturday, April 23–Sunday, July 31

A Pennsylvania Fishery celebrates the beauty and variety of game fishes that inhabit the waters of the Keystone State. Twenty different species are portrayed in luminous watercolors by noted New York artist Flick Ford. An avid angler, Ford began painting fish portraits in 1993 as a way to make a record of his catches. Over the years, he developed a watercolor technique that captures the perfection of a fish at the moment it was pulled from the water.

Main Changing Exhibit FORE! THE PLANET Saturday, May 21–Sunday, September 25

Explore a tropical rainforest, navigate a polluted waterway, follow the path of a migrating hawk—all while having fun playing miniature golf. Created by the Academy of Natural Sciences, *Fore! The Planet* features 18 holes of serious fun in which players—young and old--test their putting skills and environmental knowledge while gaining a better understanding of their environment. Each hole uses playful components to explore themes such as dinosaur extinction, bat sonar, pollution and recycling. Free with museum admission.

Academy Explorers Camp invites children ages 5 to 12 to learn about natural science in a safe, fun and engaging way. Each week of summer camp explores an exciting new theme and features an offsite field trip. From fun fossils to our amazing earth, pick a theme that best fits your child's interest. See an amazing variety of insect specimens from the Academy's world-renowned collection. Fun and activities for all ages!
