Enjoy giant insect sculptures, shells galore, and Dinosaur Days!

PHILADELPHIA—This fall discover the art within the science—and vice versa—at the Academy of Natural Sciences with a new exhibit celebrating the evolutionary beauty of insects, the annual Philadelphia Shell Show and Festival, and a whole lot more.

Bugs... Outside the Box, opening Saturday, Oct. 22, features giant, hand-crafted, anatomically correct sculptures by Italian artist Lorenzo Possenti. Meet Academy scientists and shell collectors from around the world at the annual Philadelphia Shell Show, Oct. 1 and 2, the largest show and marketplace of its kind in the Northeast. Art of Science Gallery Exhibit DUAL NATURE: SCIENCE ILLUSTRATIONS OF DAN OTTE Saturday, August 6-Sunday, December 4

See through the eyes of a renowned scientist in *Dual Nature: Science Illustrations of Dan Otte*. Dr. Daniel Otte, the Academy's Curator of Entomology and the world's leading expert on grasshoppers and crickets, shares his artistic side through this remarkable collection of animal drawings. From grasshoppers to giraffes, Otte's delightful, detailed sketches provide an unusual glimpse into the intersection between art and science.

PHILADELPHIA SHELL SHOW AND FESTIVAL Saturday and Sunday, October 1 and 2, all day

Thousands of exotic treasures of the sea will be on display and for sale when the Philadelphia Shell Show washes ashore at the Academy of Natural Sciences. The largest show of its kind in the Northeast, the Shell Show features competitive displays by collectors and amateur scientists; an international market; exotic shells and shell crafts; and behind-the-scenes tours of the museum's world-renowned mollusk collection of 10 million specimens, the third largest in the world. A festival of family activities includes hands-on activities, games, and crafts. Free with museum admission.

BUGS... OUTSIDE THE BOX October 22-January 16, 2012

Discover the art within the science in *Bugs...Outside the Box*, the Academy's newest exhibit featuring giant, detailed and anatomically correct insect sculptures created by Italian artist Lorenzo Possenti. Examine the intricate details of a butterfly wing, the eye of a dragonfly, and the appendage of a long-horn beetle—all without a microscope. Amazing live insects and colorful insect specimens from the Academy's world-renowned collection will be on display along with their hand-crafted counterparts—some up to 7 feet long. These mini-beasts of nature challenge the popular conception of beauty, and visitors will come to understand why these insects are so important to life on Earth. This exhibit is making its world premiere at the Academy.
